1750s Edgecombe Co., NC. Edward Tatum was a soldier in Captain Robert Warren's Company. Other names listed included Lt. Stephen Weaver, Elias Fort.[2]

abt 1756 Probably Edgecombe Co., NC. Edward Tatum & Martha unknown were married. Note: The family of Nathaniel Tatum & Elizabeth Hawthorn was close to the family of William Bynum, whose will Nathaniel Tatum witnessed (proved May 1746). Edward Tatum and Peter Tatum witnessed two deeds of William Bynum, Jr. Edward's sister Rebecca is hypothesized to have married James Bynum, according to Robert W. Baird, "Bob's Genealogy Filing Cabinet," www.genfiles.com. Note that the names of William Bynum's sons appear to be Luke, James, John, and William. Edward Tatum & Martha had a son Luke.

abt 1757 Edgecombe Co., NC. Daughter Elizabeth Tatum was born.

31 Jan 1757 Edgecombe Co., NC. James Bynum (county not identified) sold to John Bynum, of Edgecombe County, for 80 pounds current money of Va. 300 acres "where Edward Tatum now lives" on the upper side of Fishing Creek.[3] "Adjacent John Parrish, Thomas Drake, and the creek, as was the land he bought from William Bynum four years later," per Baird's web page. Wit.: James Cane, John Thomas, Wright Nicholnsen. Reg. Edge. Co. Feb. Ct. 1757. J. Montfort, C. Ct.

1758 Halifax Co., NC, was formed from Edgecombe Co., NC.

abt 1758 Edgecombe Co., NC. Son John Tatum was born.

20 Aug 1760 Halifax Co., NC. Edward Tatom bought for 25 lbs. 200 acres of land on north side of Fishing Creek, , joining Brock, Weaver, from Robert Butler of Halifax Co., which had been patented to said Robert Butler 20 Apr 1745Wit: Stephen Weaver, Mary "x" Powell, Martha Mackdesl-? Sept Court 1760.[4] Note the name of Stephan Weaver appears once again. He also had received 50 acres from his father's estate (Nathaniel Tatum, d. 1750 in Edgecombe Co., NC.

abt 1760 Halifax Co., NC. Son Jesse Tatum was born.

Jan 1763 Halifax Co., NC. Stephen Weaver, planter of Halifax County deeded to James Stanton of Northampton County, 10 lbs, 100 acres joining Edward Tatum, Jeremy __, Malpass, James Stanton. Witnesses: Silvanus Stanton, John Wells. January Court 1763.[5]

21 Jan 1764 Halifax Co., NC. James Bynum of Edgecombe Co., NC, to Edward Tatum of Halifax Co., NC, £20, 50 acres adjoining Weaver. Wit: Charles Daniel, Edmund Daniel. Recd Apr 1764.[6]

21 Jan 1764 Halifax County, North Carolina: Peter Tatum of Halifax County deeded to Edward Tatum of same, 21 January 1764, 35 pounds money, 50 acres joining Weaver. Witnesses: Charles Daniel, Edmund Daniel. April Court 1764.[7]

18 Aug 1764 Halifax Co., NC. Hysom (Isom) Weaver of Halifax Co. to Stephen Weaver of same. 24 pounds Virginia money. 200 acres which was part of land acquired by Robert Butler 20 Apr 1745 and which he sold to Isom Weaver , on north side of Fishing Creek, joining Edward Tatum, Jarrel Swamp. [signed] Isom Weaver Wit: Charles Daniel, Peter Tatum, Edwd. Tatum. Apr Ct 1765. CC: J. Montfort.[8]

Wit.: John Thomas, Edward Tatum, Peter Tatum.[11]

abt 1768 Halifax Co., NC. Daughter Martha Tatum was born.[12]

abt 1770 Halifax Co., NC. Son Edward Tatum, Jr., was born.

19 Sep 1772 Chatham Co., NC. Muster Roll of Captain Isaiah Hogan's militia company. Among the 110 names on this roll were William and John Bynum, John and William Hatley, Isaac, Christopher, and Gideon Kirksey, Edward Tatum, John Bird, and several other neighbors of the Murphrees. William Blyth and James Bynum were on the roll of Elisha Cain's company.[13]

abt 1775 Halifax Co., NC. Son Luke Tatum was born.

c. 1777 Chatham Co., NC. "Any twelve of the following persons be a Jury to lay out a road the best way from James Williams's Ferry into the road leading from the Island ford to Hillsborough Viz. Charles Morgan, Edward Edwards, James Rigsby, John Herndon, Luke Bynum, William Griffen, Wm. Snipes, Joseph Rosser, Oliver Brewer, Henry Brewer, Isaiah Hogan, James Kirby, Rich'd Parker, Christopher Kirksey, Isaac Kirksy, John Hatley, and Edward Tatum.[14]"

Nov 1777 Chatham Co., NC. All the hands from Terrells Creek to the Redfield Creek on the south side of Haw River, except John Herdon, Edward Tatum, William Hatley and William Griffne, work on the road leading from James William's ferry to the co nty line toward Hillsborough, and that Oliver Brewer be overseer from the ferry to the widow Powwells and that James Smith be appointed overseer of the upper part of the said road.[15]

William Hatley and Mary his wife deeded to Edward Tatum, for 50 pounds, 300 acres on the north side of Haw River on the Mill Creek, joins Tatum's own line on the old ridge Path...and Robert Poe.
